

## **2023 MEETING MINUTES**

President Ralph Neu then called the meeting to order with Arden Falk acting as Secretary of the meeting. President Ralph Neu then gave his welcome and introduced special guests.

The secretary reported the number of members present.

The members present constituted a quorum, and in accordance with the Bylaws, the meeting was duly opened.

Prior to the meeting, each member was presented with a copy of the Notice of the Meeting, and a copy of the Minutes of the October 20, 2022 annual meeting of the members. Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Minutes were approved. President Neu then directed the Secretary to annex these to the Minutes of the meeting, which are to be duly filed.

DRN President Ralph Neu and General Manager Kent Schimke presented the president's report and the manager's/CEO's reports, which were duly read, received, and placed on file. The Financial Report was then presented by Financial Manager Troy Radermacher.

provide its members with the ability to communicate with

It was 1950 when a group of people interested in organizing a telephone cooperative gathered at the Dickey County Courthouse. Articles of Incorporation were filed in November 1950 to make Dickey Rural Telephone Mutual Aid Corporation the first organization of its kind in the state.

Seventy-four years later and setbacks due to ice storms, fire damage to headquarters, and supply shortages, we are preparing to celebrate next year all the accomplishments your cooperative has made. We are planning events throughout the service territory to celebrate this milestone.

The longevity of this cooperative can be credited to the fact we continue to use our assets to capitalize our organization and network. We continue to make Network upgrades to improve the reliability of service

provided to our members. Over the past year, we continued to upgrade our 100 Gig network to 400 Gig which will reduce operating expenses and provide the necessary bandwidth demands well into the future. Our goal is always to provide the best connection whether you are working from home, a student studying for a test or trying to order parts online or bidding on equipment, land, or livestock.

As a cooperative, we are proud to operate for the benefit of our members. This year, we are pleased to announce a significant allocation of capital credits of over \$9.9 million. We have worked diligently to ensure the financial health of our cooperative, and as a result, we are able to distribute these credits back to you, our valued members.



In addition to capital credits, we are also pleased to declare dividend payouts of \$3.4 million, reflecting our strong financial performance and commitment to returning value to our members.

As we look to the future, diversification remains a key part of our strategy. We have seen significant arowth our in nonregulated revenue streams. Our Engineering services, Competitive Local Exchange Carrier (CLEC) operations, and Managed Service Provider (MSP) offerings have all contributed to our financial strength.

These non-regulated revenues are vital in supporting our core mission while also allowing us to explore new opportunities and mitigate risks. By expanding our services beyond traditional broadband, we are creating a more resilient and dynamic cooperative, one that is well-positioned to thrive in an increasingly competitive environment and uncertain regulatory environment.

As we work together for the betterment of your broadband cooperative, we also work for progress in our communities. We are proud to support our communities with donations to non-profit organizations, volunteering, youth programs and by being active participants in local events and organizations.

Purchasing service from a cooperative means that you are an invested owner, and you have a voice through a Board that you elect. By participating in the Annual Meeting, you can exercise your right to elect the board members who set the direction for the Cooperative. These Board members review the financial health of the cooperative and set the future goals and directives of the Cooperative. We encourage all members to attend the Annual Meeting.

# Financial REPORT

Welcome to the 74th Annual Meeting of Dickey Rural Telephone Cooperative. It is our pleasure and duty to provide you with the financial statements for 2023.

The Board of Directors met at 12 regular meetings and one special meeting during the past year. In addition to the regularly scheduled monthly meetings, various directors attended state, regional and national meetings vital to the cooperative and rural telecommunication services. All action taken by the Board at their meetings is recorded in the minutes book, which is up to date and open for inspection by cooperative members at the headquarters location in Ellendale, ND.

The balance sheet and operating statement contained in this annual report were prepared from our audited books and recorded by Moss Adams, LLP. These reports, along with our statistical information and data, will give you a detailed presentation of the present financial condition of the company as well as how it did during the past year.





Increase in Revenue came from higher sales from security, engineering, and an increase in Internet subscribers.



In 2023, the company invested **\$11,057,494** in various plant upgrades throughout the service area.

Decrease in Net Margins came from higher operating expenses and \$972,393 less in realized investment income.

In the past, DRTC has invested in several businesses that have shown to be profitable to the company which continued in 2023.

- Dakota Carrier Network (DCN) realized a profit of \$615,971 for our share and returned \$242,464 of our original capital investment.
- Verizon Wireless Partnership paid a dividend of \$1,292,732 for our share of the distribution.
- Our share of North Dakota Long Distance (NOLD) paid a distribution of \$40,000.

# Independent Auditor's REPORT

### **Report on the Financial Statements**






















































































